From the Historian's Desk

Rochester Democrat and Chronicle, Tuesday, September 30, 1947

Byron Boys Go for Buggies, Rig 'Rigs' with Old Motors


Byron---Remember back in the twenties how the youngsters fooled around with stripped-down Model T's! Well, today they still are fooling around but, what with the automobile shortage, it really takes sheer genius to rig up some good cheap haywire transportation (and we mean haywire).

In Byron, several groups of boys are installing light motors in some old buggies and actually making them work as good or better than in the early days of the automobile. The usual recipe goes something like this: Take an old carriage or buggy, practically anything which has four wheels, and set an old farm motor, (1/2-horse-power or up), anywhere on its floor, figure some way to belt the power to a wheel, add a method of steering, hang a couple of lanterns on front and there you have it!

Two boys, David Leaton and Alen Hanson, both of Byron are using a 2-horsepower auxiliary farm engine in theirs. It is mounted on the floor back of the seat on a sliding base and it drives the right rear wheel through a belt and roller chain. The purpose of the sliding base is to tighten the drive belt when the engine is slid forward, thus serving as a clutch. This action is accomplished by pulling a rope in front of the seat. The brake is simple a stick, across the under side of the buggy, which rubs on the wheels when rocked back by an outboard foot pedal.

There are many ingenious systems of steering being used. Working on the latest model of such a device are Chester Schultz and William Spencer who will use a drum, rope and pully combination with a real steering wheel. Others simply apply attach a rope and pull on the side toward which they want to go.

The boys can get up to 25 miles an hour out of these things, believe it or not, and this is rough going, because they confine their riding to private farm roads. Cost, incidentally, are low. Many buggies have been picked up for \$2. In fact, once when one was wrecked while testing, a farmer offered the boys their pick of a couple other buggies just to get rid of them. This probably is not a trend, but it sure is a lot of fun for a lot boys around Byron this year.

Byron Cemetery Association

We have endured a very warm and dry summer. This meant less lawn mowing for everyone. John Durand always does an excellent job of mowing the cemetery lawn. He continues to maintain the cemetery with the assistance of Dave Leaton. We are very grateful for the work they provide to keep the cemetery looking wonderful. A gentle reminder to remove flowers, pots, decorations, etc. at grave sites by October 1st. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

The Cemetery Association's Annual Meeting and Trustees Meeting were held on April 20th. Reports from the secretary, treasurer and co-superintendents were presented, discussed and approved. Trustees were elected and the slate of current officers was approved for another term of office. John and Donna Durand were appointed the co-superintendents. The cost of a full body burial will increase on September 1, 2022 to \$675. Veterans who have been buried at the Byron Cemetery are now able to be disinterred and buried at the National Veterans Cemetery in Pembroke. Pricing and an explanation of disinterment is below.

Updated Pricing for Byron Cemetery – Approved by NYS 6/30/2022 Prices in effect as of 9/1/2022

Sale of Lot (4'x10') - \$600.00

Burial Costs:

Full body burial (Human only) - \$675.00

Cremation burial (Human) – \$400.00

Cremation burial (Pet) - \$400.00

Additional Fees:

Burial on Sunday and/or holiday \$100.00

Winter Burial (requiring snow removal) \$100.00

Disinterment Costs/Rules:

Person making the request must be the plot owner, next of kin, and have legal authority to make the request, or a court order.

Must have all the proper permits required with a list of permits required.

The move can only be made between May 1st and November 1st of any year.

Arrangements must be made at least two weeks in advance to properly schedule the work to be done.

Payment must be made prior to work being done.

Remains should be in a solid container.

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Costs:

Full body removal - 2.5 times the current cost for full body burial (\$1687.50)

Cremated remains removal - \$150 for labor to locate remains. Opening/closing cost for cremation burial. \$400
