
Tentatively the Bicentennial Celebration will be in August 2021.

Bicentennial 200th Anniversary Celebration Fireworks





Spring did not bring the typical weather of warm and sunny days. It seems like spring was omitted and a quick switch turned to summer weather. John Durand and Dave Leaton have been busy getting the cemetery lawn, bushes and grave sites whipped into shape. We are so grateful for their dedication to maintaining our small town cemetery. We appreciate their willingness to give of their time and energy.

Exciting News! Tom Chapell, owner of Visual Impact Graphics, has designed a few new signs for the cemetery. He has graciously done this at no charge. The signs will display the rules of the cemetery, contact names and phone numbers as well as a map of the cemetery. The map will be useful in locating graves, which Kate Wride has meticulously organized on a spread sheet. We are blessed with many wonderful volunteers in Byron. The main sign on Townline Road needs replacing and Tom is providing that as well. Be on the lookout for these new signs as they will be installed in the near future.

Speaking of rules ~ a gentle reminder to place flowers and decorations in a straight line with the stones to make mowing and trimming easier. Decorations may be placed in the cemetery between April 1st and October 1st. A reminder that live plants should not be planted in the cemetery without approval from the Cemetery Association. They require maintenance that needs to be taken into consideration. Glass containers are prohibited for safety reasons. Kindly remove items when they become weathered or unsightly.

The cemetery is a peaceful and tranquil area to take a walk and observe the many names of Byron residents. It's also an honor to see all the veteran markers on many graves. Veteran markers have been replaced and updated this year. We are grateful to the men and women who have fought for our freedom. We request that the cemetery be treated with respect and dignity. If you walk your dog through the cemetery, keep them on a leash and clean up after them. We are proud of our well maintained cemetery.

Thinking about purchasing a plot for your final resting place? John and Donna Durand, Superintendents of the Byron Cemetery, would be glad to assist you in this process. There are many plots available and the Durand's can show them to you. Preplanning for burials can make decisions easier for those who are grieving. Pets are also welcome at the cemetery. Byron-Bergen Imagination Library

The Byron-Byron community is approaching its fifth year sending age appropriate children’s books, provided by the Imagination Library through the Richter Family Foundation. As of January 2020 we have delivered over 4,000 books to our important residents of the Byron-Bergen school district, ages birth to 5 years.

This program is only possible with local donations. At present we provide approximately 110 children in the Byron-Bergen district with monthly books. This program would not be possible without the generous donations we have received from local individuals, businesses and organizations. All tax deductible donations are used entirely to pay for the books and postage. Byron-Bergen donations are used solely for the Byron-Bergen district children. The cost per year per child is approximately \$25.00 to receive monthly books.

Without the donations the children would not have this program be a reality, which we believe encourages our young future leaders to develop a love of reading.

The Richter Family Foundation provides brochures, handles the registering and ordering, and provides the necessary 501(c)(3) non-profit status the local community needs to raise the funds to participate, through the tax deductible donations.

We need community monetary support to help keep this program active. We welcome donations of any amount, at any time. Please consider sponsoring a new baby, grandchild, neighbor or friend. Historians

Dear Town of Byron Residents,

Since the beginning of the New York State on Pause & the Corvid Virus Pandemic on March 16, 2020, we have been learning a new style of living.

We have been asked by New York State to try and record how the Town of Byron has dealt with & been affected by this situation. The way to do this accurately is to ask each resident, business, farm, and organization to participate from their point of view & experience.

Things to record:

- Did you have the virus?
- How was your job was affected (work from home, still go to work, laid-off)
- How was your Business affected?
- How did it affect your organization? Meetings, fundraisers, etc.
- How did you celebrate a loved one's birthday, graduation, bridal shower, wedding, baby shower, wedding anniversary, etc.
- What did you do to relax? read a book, watch tv, listen to music, call a love one, take a drive
- How did you communicate with your doctor? By phone, computer, at the office, cancelled appointment
- Were you able to complete a project that you put off?
- How else did you spend your time?
- What else you think is important to note for future generations to understand what changed our lives and what was able to stay routine or normal.

For example:

Bob has been blessed not to have the virus to this point.

Bob has still been working his shifts at the Dialysis Unit in Batavia each week. So his job is considered essential. The PPE (personal protection equipment) at his job became limited and had to wear his mask longer to address the shortage. He had to have his vitals & temperature checked upon arrival at work to make sure he hadn't contracted the virus. The hand sanitizer was replaced with a higher percentage of alcohol in it for the patients and his protection. His patients weren't allowed in the treatment area until they too had vitals & temperature checked. The patient's family could only drop them off and pick them up. With his job working for a dialysis facility the need has not changed and has stayed normal amount of patient for care during this pandemic.

As most of you know Bob is a Volunteer Firefighter for South Byron Volunteer Fire Company. He still responds to calls with a heightened awareness of using PPE. The PPE used to be more of a thought for the patient care. Now it is the concern not to become a carrier of the disease as well. He attends his meetings with his mask or by video.

He has had a doctor appointment by phone, telemedicine, and in person. All three appointments were handled in a different manner than usual. The most noticeable the wearing of face-masks & gloves at all times by the medical personal, and Bob wearing a mask. This experience has made us aware how much we tend to read the medical personals facial expressions during our visits before the pandemic. Now it is trying to tell what the eyes saying (concern, no concern).

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Bob's birthday was the beginning of April, he turned 68. We ordered take-out for the two of us. Our daughter's families called and wished him a Happy Birthday. A couple of days later our neighbor Skip celebrated his 75th Birthday. His family invited us to take part in a parade to surprise him. Skip's birthday was on Easter Sunday. This was a fun way to celebrate out of the ordinary.

Bob has enjoyed watching the You-tube channel on the television. He usually watches videos on woodturning, listening to music, historical channel, and how to videos.

Bob and I both noticed that it is difficult to keep track of the day of the week or date. We have felt at times we were experiencing the movie Ground Hog Day where the main character wakes up to the same day repeatedly.

We miss being able to visit with our grandchildren and play with them. Our six grandchildren range in age from newborn to 8 years old. We miss the celebration of holidays and special events with family and friends.

***Please consider participating in the project. We need as many residents as possible to write up their experience. This is intended to include children, teenagers, adults. Each person will have a different view of the experience that will show how we survive our challenge of living in a different standard of living. Byron is a very special place to live. Our community is a family that supports and encourages each other. Thank you in advance for participating.

Byron Rescue Squad

It's time for a change. The Byron Rescue Squad is ready for a new ambulance. Their current ambulance will be 12 years old this month. It is currently at the Churchville Fire Equipment Repair Shop undergoing some much needed repairs. When the cost of repairs begins to rise and you have an older ambulance it is time to start looking for a replacement.

The Byron Rescue Squad averages over 100 calls a year. They are part of the Byron Fire Department #1 just off Route 262. The EMS Services started in 1975. Rescue Squad Captain Brad Nickerson has been an EMT for over 15 years. The Squad has recently moved to an Advanced Life Support level to better help those in need. There are currently 12 EMT's in the Squad. Three are certified as Advanced EMT's. The Rescue Squad does not charge for its services and all the members are Volunteers. They do not receive any pay for their Service to our community.

So, how does the Byron Rescue Squad pay for an ambulance and medical supplies? The answer is easy. The residents of Byron donate each year when they receive a Fund Drive letter. Other donations received during the year all add up and keep this valuable service going. With the arrival of Covid19 the need for EMS has remained high but their ability to Fund Raise has become much harder. The need for a new ambulance to cover 911 calls for the next 12 years is an additional strain on their finances. So, a GoFundMe page has been started in addition to the annual Fund Drive Letter this year. The Rescue Squad is asking for your help to spread the word and support this worthy cause.

We have seen the best in people during this crisis. With families struggling to make ends meet it is hard to ask for help. The Byron Rescue Squad needs your help as they return their current ambulance to service and push to reach their Goal of a new ambulance. They thank everyone who has contributed over the years and to those who will help them reach their GoFundMe goal this year.
